
ASHLEY HALL ILLUSTRATED

Which one of the golfers is Mr. Hipp?


Spot the Difference

Sweeping upward in magnificent fashion,

the McBee Staircase is one of the most iconic images on campus. It is also one of the inspirations for the name of Ashley Hall's Learning Spiral, a teaching philosophy that guides and shapes the School's educational programs and practices. An Ashley Hall girl's journey is similar to a spiral as she is always growing, expanding her knowledge, and building her awareness of the world around her.

Prior to becoming Ashley Hall, the McBee House and estate

belonged to Charles Otto Witte, who kept his six daughters entertained with a pet bear and alligator as well as their very own aviary in the Shell House. Now McBee House is the center of one of the premier girls' schools in the nation. ** What is your first memory of McBee House!



Renowned sculptor Willard Newman Hirsch (1905-1982) was born and raised in Charleston, where he returned after an illustrious career in New York City. His "Little Dancer" statue is a favorite on campus. Younger students often leave flowers and prized shells around her feet and have been known to worry about her during the colder months because she doesn't wear shoes!
